This treaty was signed in 1877 with the Stoney Nakoda Nation (Bearspaw, Chiniki, Wesley), the Blackfoot Confederacy (Kainai, Piikani, Siksika), the Tsuut' ina and Queen Victoria. Historically, there is a long standing connection to this valley by many Indigenous Nations who travelled the area - the Ktunaxa, Secwepemc, Métis, Dene & Mountain Cree, along with the Tsuut' ina, Blackfoot and Stoney Nakoda peoples.

The Whyte Museum inspires discovery and wonder when people and the Rocky Mountains meet. We share stories and explore the culture shaped by this mountain landscape.
